### REDFIELD INVITATIONAL

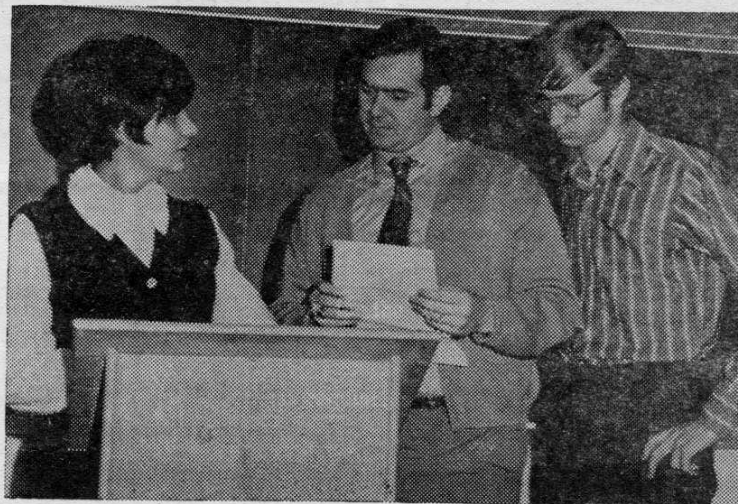
Fifteen area schools attended the Redfield Invitational Debate Tournament held on January 9. Thirty-nine teams entered the event.

### Sincere Studying Produces Success

Now that the second nine weeks period is over, all of the students will be receiving their report cards. But evaluation of one's progress and achievements in the first semester shouldn't end at simply checking what one's grades are on his report card.

Usually, a person's letter grade represents only a part of his accomplishments in a particular subject. It is generally an evaluation of a student's ability to memorize certain facts and to apply them to a certain degree. But a student's ability to understand and utilize these facts is difficult to measure in terms of letter grades.

Another factor which isn't included in report card evaluations is a student's competence in remembering important material over a long period of time. Some students have the ability to memorize the essential information in a lesson, but forget it shortly afterwards.

These are two important factors to consider when in school. Too many students study for their grades, not their education. Too much emphasis on grades could prevent a student from getting a complete education; he could achieve only short-term benefits. It is up to each student to see that he is not affected by the over-stressed importance of grades and that he get the type of education he needs.

At this time of the year the days seem to pass quicker; the problem of language is a little one now. I shall give many speeches; I will enjoy to do it. I want to speak with people, to share ideas. During this short time I have changed a lot; it happens I can explain myself, my own actions, because I do not react the same way I used to.

When I was coming to this country, I do know the economy, the government, the geography — but not the people. My experience is based on simple things, not on complicated ideas but on routine life. Many questions are still unsolved and puzzle me. I believe I have made a lot of mistakes because of ignorance. In five months I have been hurt in my beliefs, ideas, even of the difference of my own church. I shall remember this year forever, it brings me a lot now, but it will bring much more in the future.

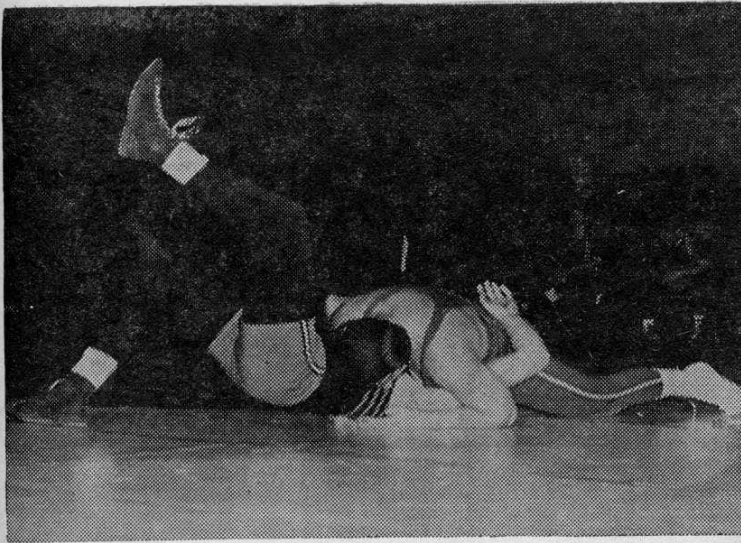
4. The subjects you're taking seeming to be arriving at the most unexciting parts.

## Pheasants Second In Conference, Prepare For Milbank, Clark Comets

Redfield plays host to Milbank January 22. Earlier in the season the Golden Pheasants defeated the Bulldogs by 17 points. Last year Redfield split two games with the Bulldogs, who went to the State "A" Tournament.

Clark will be the site of a key NEC battle January 29. Clark leads the conference, with Redfield currently in second place. Earlier in the season Clark used its superior height to hand the Pheasants their only conference loss.

Again the Pheasants will take to the road January 30. They will travel to Faulkton to play the Trojans. Redfield handed the Trojans a defeat last year in the non-conference game.

Webster handed Redfield their third defeat of the season. Webster defeated the Pheasants 84-80 January 16 at Webster. The Bearcats led at all quarter stops, and had a decisive margin in rebounding.

Dave Battey led the Pheasants' cause with 23 points, while Bob Patterson was close behind with 22. In a preliminary game, the Redfield B team earned their second victory with a two point win, 52-50.

Redfield handed winless Sisseton their eighth straight conference loss last Friday night, 78-48. The contest was played at the Sisseton arena.

The Pheasants completely dominated the game. They doubled the score on the Redmen at halftime 46-23. The Pheasants, who lead the conference in total offense, then coasted to their sixth NEC win in seven starts.

Senior guards Chuck Welke and Bob Patterson paced Redfield with

16 points apiece. Dave Battey popped in 13 while Terry Newman, Dennis Lovett and Gary Ratigan each scored 8.

Redfield's "B" team gave the undefeated Sisseton "B" squad all they could handle in the preliminary game. The Redmen managed a 45-39 come from behind victory.

Moberidge was the scene of a Pheasant victory January 9. Redfield cagers raised their season record to 7-2 with a 93-57 victory over the Tigers. Reserves played most of the second half for the Pheasants, who led all the way.

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The Pheasants met a formidable Moberidge opponent January 9 in the Redfield armory. The Pheasants defeated the Tigers 31-15. Bruce Cartner, Mike Remillard, and Kim Benning pinned their opponents in the first period. Gary Lambert and Dave Albrecht were able to pin their Tiger grapplers in the second period. Russ Simon handled his man 17-0 and Mike Osborn won a 7-3 decision.

RHS racked up another NEC win with a 45-2 whitewashing of the Groton Tigers. The match was held January 8 in Groton.

The Pheasants traveled to Britton on January 2, for a Northeast Conference battle with the Braves.

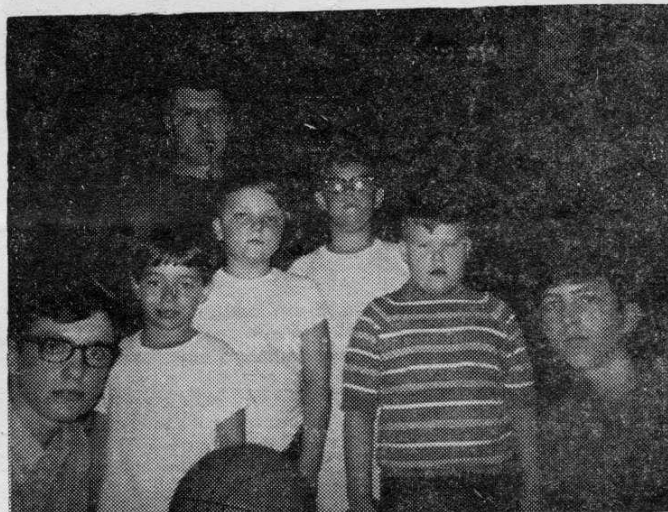

Each week students in the advanced algebra class of Mr. Henry Dunkel elect a "Student of the Week." The selection is based upon outstanding contributions to RHS.

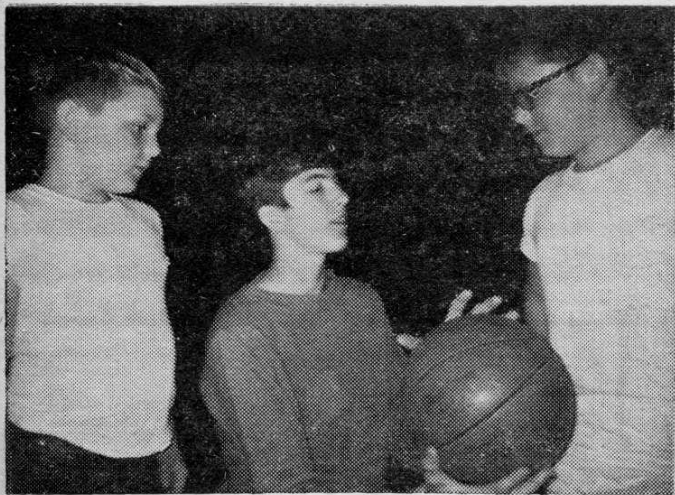
