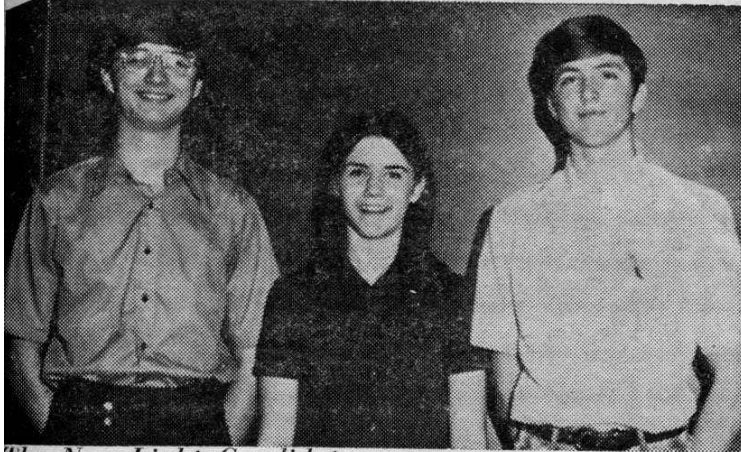

## Redfield Musicians, Vocalists Earn High Ratings At Region IV Judging

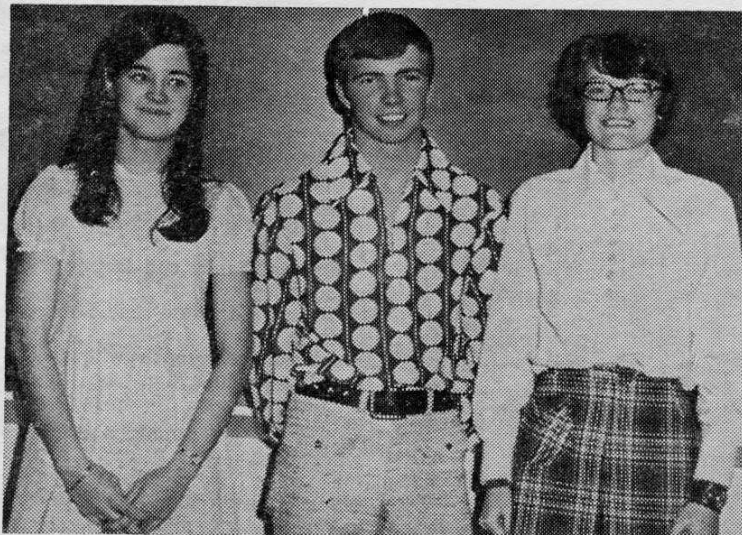

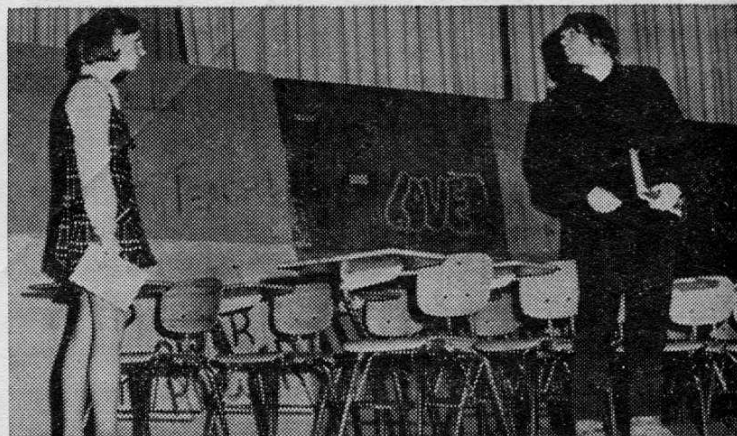
Extra - curricular activities should also be examined. Simple

# Track Team Enters Area Meets; Lovett Receives Mayor's Trophy

Dennis Lovett of Redfield won the annual Mayor's Trophy for the outstanding athlete of the 1971 Redfield Relays. Over 1300 athletes and 60 schools competed in the Relays held on April 16.

Lovett placed first in the long jump and triple jump with leaps of 20' 10" and 40' 10", respectively. The three-sport letterman also ran on the winning Class A Hurdle Relay and took fifth in the 120 yard high hurdles.

Redfield's other relay win came in the 880 yard relay. Dean Jankord, Kevin Boschee, Bob Patterson and Bob Roggenthen combined 220's for a 1:36 time, only .8 seconds off the meet record.

Pheasant teams took two seconds and a fourth in other relays. Jankord, Eric Flint, Boschee and Patterson placed second in the 440 yard relay with a time of 46.4. Don and Bob Zundel, Rod Hardie and Mario Hansen teamed for a second place finish in the 2-mile relay.

## Faculty Falls To Key Club

RHS Key Clubbers were nipped 26-24 by the Keyettes, but they retaliated by downing the faculty 89-48. The games were held in the armory on March 29.

In the Key-Keyette game the Key Clubbers were required to wear boxing gloves on their shooting hands and patches over their eyes. Don Zundel led the scoring for the Keys with 10 points. The Keyettes had a balanced scoring attack.

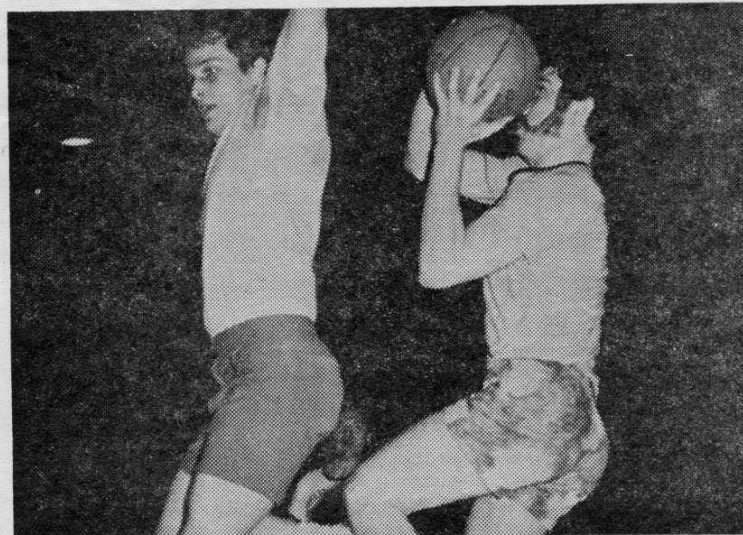
The second game of the evening found the Key Clubbers meeting the faculty. After being defeated the past few years, the Keys got revenge with Robert Patterson's leading the scoring with 21 points.

Alan Johnson won the high and low hurdles. Scott Hicks took fourth in both events with Dennis Lovett placing third in the highs.

Lovett won the long jump and triple jump. Hicks took third in the former while Dave and Russ Battey placed third and fourth, respectively, in the latter.

Coach Ken Greeno has planned a new meet for April 27. Redfield will host the Northern Plains Meet. As the name indicates, the event is for the towns in the Northern Plains of South Dakota.

Due to poor weather conditions, the Redfield track team has been unable to attend the yearly Sisseton Relays for the past two seasons. This year the relays fall on April 30 and the RHS thinclads are scheduled to attend. The meet will give the Pheasants an opportunity to view their conference competition as most NEC teams will be competing.

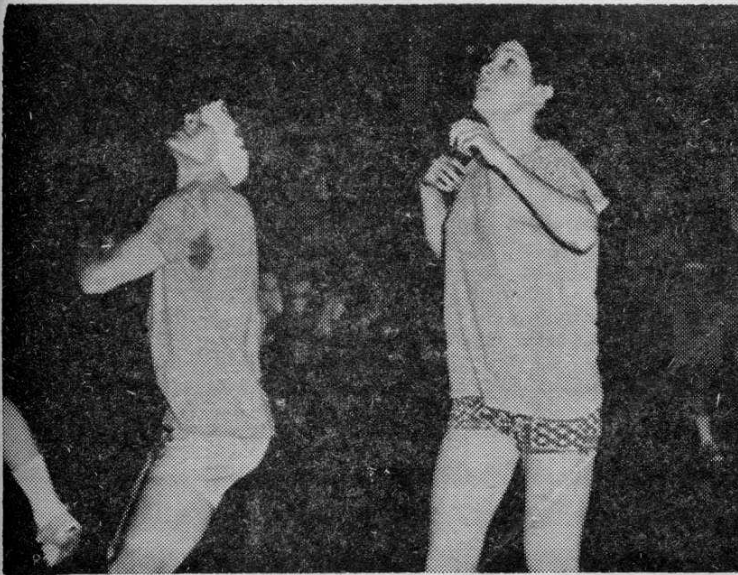

won a four year scholarship in 1961, and Sarah Perry won a \$1000 scholarship in 1968.

The scholarships are paid for by foundations, business and industrial corporations, labor unions, and individual sponsors. Lynette's scholarship comes from IBM and is known as the Thomas J. Watson Memorial Merit Scholarship.

Lynette was chosen from 15,000 Merit Finalists. These are chosen from the students who take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test which is given to those interested in the program. Those taking the initial test numbered 710,000.

Winners of the scholarships are free to attend any school of their choice. Lynette plans to study music education at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota.

The convention, held at the Diplomat Hotel in Huron on April 24, attracted more than 300 people from a three-state area.

Thirteen Redfield Key Clubbers attended the convention. They were accompanied by faculty advisor James Wallman and Kiwanis advisor Jack Boub.
