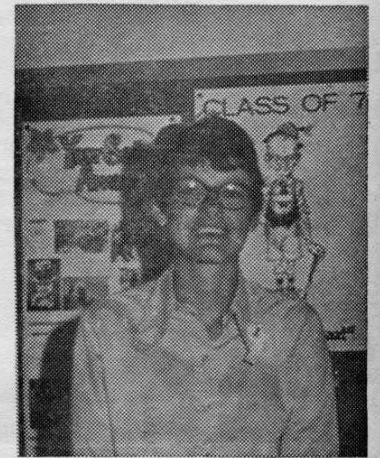

From The Editor...

Student Council Needs Revision

Student council's importance will grow in school affairs in the next few years. Decisions will have to be made, and the council will deliberate over them with the best interests of the students in mind. So, with student government's role becoming more important, a close look should be given to the organization involved with it.

One facet of student council that must be corrected is representation. Representation in student council now is a mixture of conflicting personal interests and inadequate representation for the entire student body.

It seems as though a representative, after he is elected, rarely seeks to find the consensus of the group he represents; he just acts on his own behalf. Misrepresentation, if it occurs, can be corrected easily enough by asking each spokesman to reflect the views of his group's opinions in any way he sees fit, so long as he has consulted with his constituents.

A second problem area can be found in the structure of our student government. A look at the list of representatives gives ample reason why student council is not a direct voice of the students. If this organization is to be a representation of student views, then each student should have equal say in student matters. But the roster of members indicates a criterion of belonging to organizations for a say in student government. What this amounts to is over-representation for students, involved in several activities.

If what we seek is a group reflecting the students' wishes, then a possible answer would be to limit representation to classes alone. At the same time the number of representatives from each class would be increased.

These two simple but necessary changes could make student council a much more relevant organization. With informed spokesmen and fair representation, we can be assured that student council will act on the students' behalf.

AFS Student Compares Tests

With the results of nine weeks tests in the offing, I remember the end of the first half of a school term at home. Our terms were twelve weeks long but they are split with two or three days holiday after six weeks. By that time you need a holiday.

The school year starts the first or second week in September and ends the third or fourth week in July. Like here the school year is thirty-six weeks but split into groups of twelve weeks. Starting in September, the first term ends about a week before Christmas but with a break about the end of October.



The second term starts the first week in January and ends the week before Easter. After three weeks' holiday, school resumes until July.

Every six weeks, on a minimum, we have tests on what we have done in all the subjects we take, which usually means about nine tests in one week to ten days of school, that is. Once I had eight tests in one day, despite my violent protest. The worst exams come at the end of the year when we are tested on the years' work.

They are the worst until the end of the fifth year in secondary school, or eleventh grade. Then the exams are on the work from the previous two and sometimes the previous five years which really takes work as we really have to know our work.

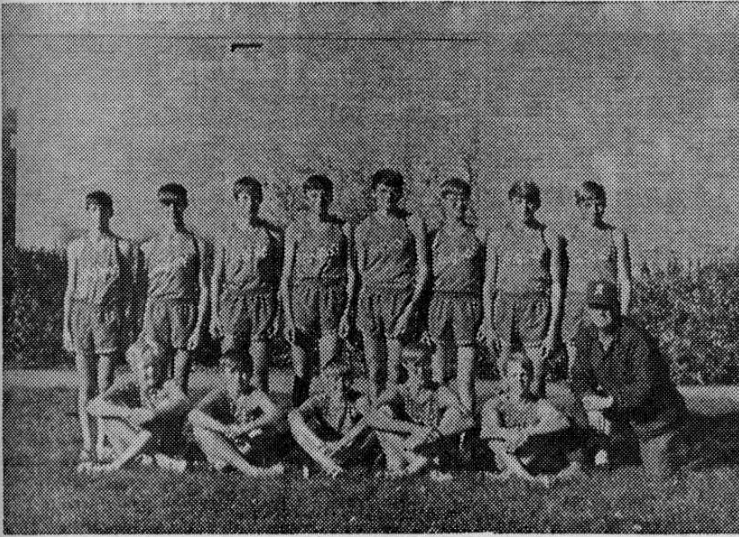
