Science Career Day was held on the campus of Northern State College on November 13. The event was sponsored by the Nekota Association of Science Teachers.

About 80 students from Redfield Junior High and High School attended the program. Among the

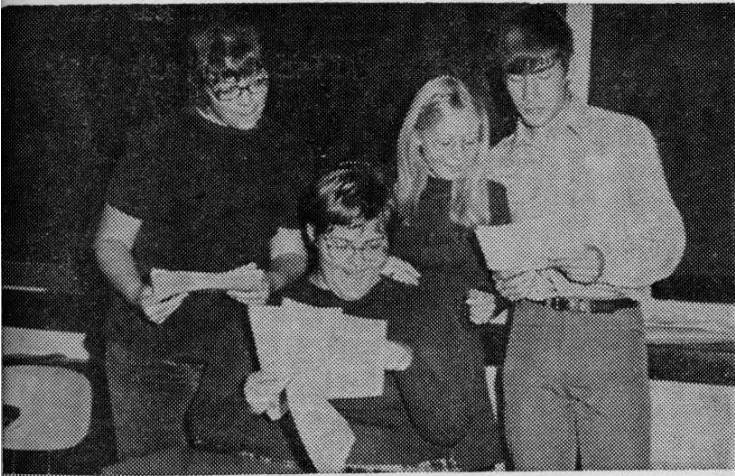

Nekota is an association of junior and senior high science teachers in northeastern South Dakota. Science Career Day is held in conjunction with the group's annual meeting.

Lectures were presented by practicing scientists in each particular discipline. Sciences represented were physics, medical and para-medical, agricultural science, chemistry, medical technology, biology, geology, meteorology. Engineering was also discussed in several of the meetings.

The students selected 3 of the 8 sessions. There was also time for tours of the biology, chemistry, and physics labs of NSC. In addition, a special film was shown on lab safety.

Highlights included talking to a computer in Omaha, Nebr., courtesy of Northwestern Bell Telephone Co., and pace maker machine and x-ray demonstration by Doug Partika of Dakota Midland Hospital.

Redfield AFS Selects Student As Finalist

Chosen recently to represent RHS in the Americans Abroad Student Program is Mary Todd. Her application is now sent to New York for further consideration.

To be eligible, certain requirements must be met by the candidate. Firstly, he must be at least 16 and either a senior or a junior. He must have taken or be taking his second year of a foreign language, and be in good health. Too, he must have a high grade average. The applicant must possess imagination, curiosity, interest in people, and an out-going personality.

Mary also had to write an essay which, along with the other required information, has been sent to New York for final selection.

Here her application is screened by professionals at the International Americans Abroad office.

Since there is a shortage of homes available, Mary will accept either the summer or the year-round program, preferably in the Northern Hemisphere. If she is selected as a finalist, she will be notified shortly but will not know her destination until this summer.

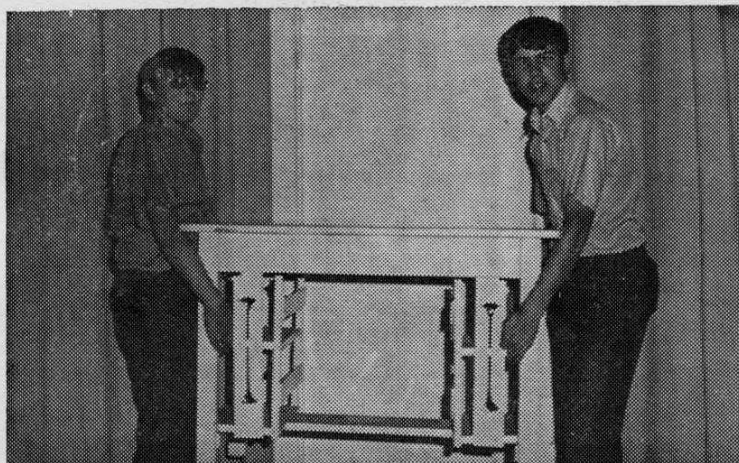

Editorially Speaking...

Students Overemphasize Athletics

Athletics is a facet of high school life greatly over-emphasized by many students. Many teenagers fail to realize how much more important knowledge and wisdom gained through academic activities will be later in life than athletic ability.

We are in school to learn, and sports should take second priority to more beneficial interests. Service clubs and other extracurricular activities outside of athletics are thought of as not worthwhile, or too much work by many, as is evidenced by lack of interest in clubs. In actuality, these organizations will prepare us for the challenges and responsibilities of adult life in our society as well as any athletic participation can hope to prepare us.

Athletics has long been thought of as a character builder. This is in many cases false, however, as proved in a recent issue of the magazine *PSYCHOLOGY TODAY*. An article in this magazine brought out the fact that intense competition by young athletes often tends to bring out the tendencies of cheating and foul play in us, rather than reaching the desired ends of strengthened character and increased moral fiber.

Students are frequently not accepted by many of their peers if they are not active in athletics. Cliques are formed by those who participate in sports, and other individuals who are equals of the athletes but perhaps have other interests, are excluded from many social activities merely because of lack of interest in sports. It is time that teenagers realize that academic interests are the purpose of our school years, and athletics should be of secondary concern.

With the senior play being a prominent issue at the moment, I thought perhaps I could say a little about my school's play.

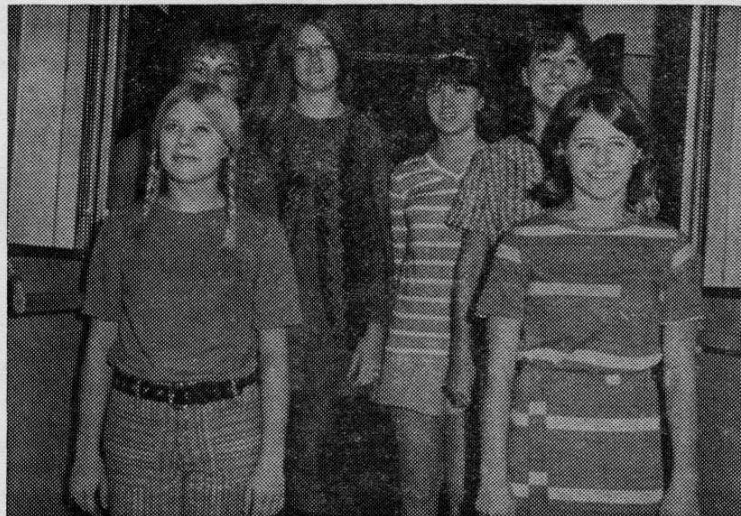
The play was "As ou Like It," by William Shakespeare, the first Shakespearean play the school had done for six years. Rehearsals

Usually the last week and a half there is full lighting and a full set for the actions.

All the work on the set lighting and costumes is done by students under the supervision of the staff, but most of the ideas come from the students. This year rehearsals were made more complicated by the electricity being turned off because of a strike of workers in generating plants.

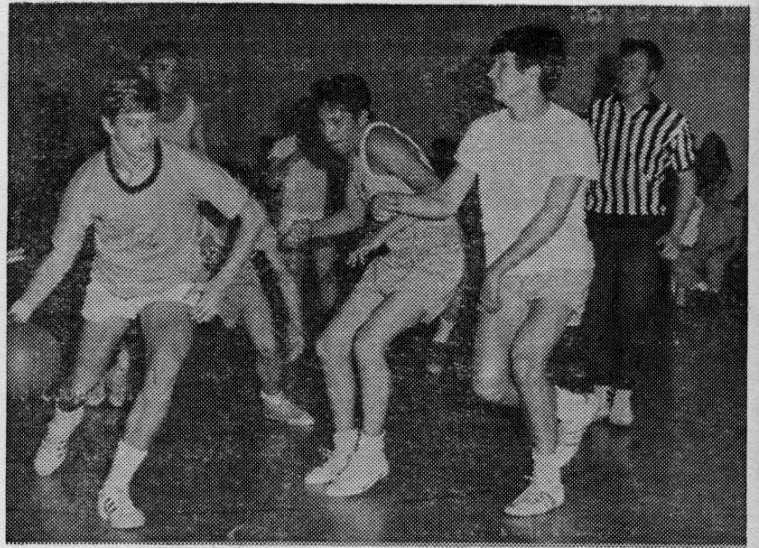
Our play takes place in the spring of the year and is put on for three days at the end of the

RHS Key Club Initiates Project At State School

Key Clubbers from Redfield High School have initiated Project "Reach Out," which is intended to aid the residents at the State School and Hospital. President Don Zundel is in charge of organizing the project.

The project involves two phases: understanding and involvement. Key Clubbers hope to foster a better understanding and attitude of mental retardation as well as to help the residents.

The first phase began with a two-hour briefing session given by Mr. Howard Chinn, superintendent of the institution, and Mrs. Jack

Maher, who is supervising the project. The program centered around a background of mental retardation and a discussion of the mentally handicapped. This was done to broaden the club members' knowledge so that they can better cope with the problem when they work with the residents. A similar program will be presented to the student body November 30. This will hopefully dispell many of the misconceptions surrounding mental retardation.

Involvement has taken place with the implementation of the "buddy" program. Each Key Club member is paired with a resident with whom he will work throughout the school year. Assisting in recreation will be the major area of concern as club members will work on bowling, pool, and foosball. Some Key Clubbers will work with swimming instructions. Residents will also be taken to athletic events.

Mr. Chinn commented about Project Reach Out: "The Key Club must be admired for its ambition and desire to work in a service capacity. I am confident that both the residents and Key Clubbers will profit from their experiences in working together."

RHS Coach Records Stats

Another football season has ended, and the Pheasants have again completed a successful season. Taking into consideration that Redfield's young and relatively inexperienced team was hampered all season by injuries and often less than ideal playing conditions, Coach Rollie Nielson did a fine job molding the Pheasants into a solid working unit.

One of the highlights of the season was the play of senior fullback Bob Tiff. Despite being unable to play the first three games of the season because of a shoulder injury, Tiff came back to rush for 708 yards on 141 carries in only six games. This averages out to five yards a carry and an average of 118 yards per game. Another interesting fact is that in scoring eight touchdowns, Tiff crossed the goal line every seventeenth time he received the ball.

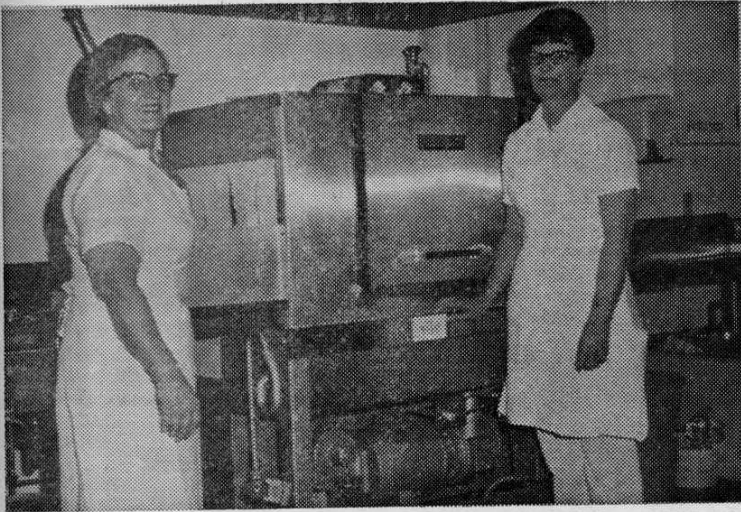

Lunch Program Provides Proper Nutrition Needs

South Dakota would have more undernourished and unhealthy school students if it weren't for the school lunch program. Mrs. Cora Greeno is in charge of the type A meals that the RHS students receive weekly.

Approximately 900 type A meals are prepared daily by six ladies and served by twenty student workers in RHS. Lunchroom personnel in addition to Mrs. Greeno include Mrs. Arlene Mowry, Mrs. Nellie Moeller, Mrs. Eulalia Leesch, Mrs. Viola Hall, and Mrs. Orlia Erickson. On special days the meals may run as high as 1000 meals per day.

Type A meals provide at least one-third of a child's daily nutritional requirements. These lunches contain edible protein, fruit, and vegetables, bread products, milk products, Vitamin C and iron daily, and Vitamin A twice a week.

Student cost per meal is 25 cents. The 35-cent adult price results because only the student milk price is reimbursed to the district under the special milk program.

Special services provided by the lunchroom are the use of kitchen facilities available to school oriented groups and catering staffed by the lunchroom personnel. For example, the lunchroom provides the food for the Junior-Senior banquet, FFA banquet, etc. The lunchroom will also cook for

Future Nurses Club Plans Diabetes Week

In recognition of Diabetes Week, November 14-20, the Future Nurses Club collected envelopes with test tapes from the Redfield Public School students. Mrs. Karen Boyd and Mrs. Diann Steinhauer are in charge of diabetic checks in Redfield.

The girls will now assist the Extension Clubs in checking the returned tapes. Only individuals with positive results will be notified.

Conservatively estimated, 4-400,000 Americans are diabetic; 1,600,000 do not know they have the disease. It is in everyone's interest to be tested and to recognize the most common symptoms: excessive thirst, frequent urination, constant hunger, loss of weight, itching, tendency to tire easily, changes in vision, and

slow healing of cuts and scratches.

Diabetes is the fifth leading cause of death by disease, the second leading cause of blindness, and a contributing cause of heart attacks. Diabetes, however, can be controlled. For many diabetics only careful diet and regulated exercise are needed. Others require either insulin injections or use of oral drugs.

Band Hears NSC Director
