From The Editor...

Handbook Determines Rights

The South Dakota Department of Public Instruction sponsored a Workshop on Student's Rights and Responsibilities in June 1972. The result of this workshop is a new pamphlet "Guide to Student Rights and Responsibilities in South Dakota," a long needed book declaring the rights of students.

Some of the more important clauses of the handbook should be brought to the attention of all of the students. High school students have the right to express their opinions verbally or in writing; they have the right to dress in such a way as to express his/her personality.

It has been determined by law that school officials have the authority to control student conduct at all school sponsored activities. In the area of freedom of expression, students may wear freedom buttons and armbands as long as disruption does not occur. Students are also allowed to prepare written materials of school property and distribute them in the school building if responsible journalism is used. Freedom of expression also has a corollary: the right to remain silent. Students may refrain from answering any question that may be incriminating.

The courts have unanimously upheld the claim that school lockers are school property and may be searched at any time without permission of the student. Suspension and expulsion are disciplinary measures involving exclusion from school. Suspension is usually from three to five days while expulsion may be longer up until the end of the term. The only grounds upon which a high school student may be expelled or suspended are for insubordination or habitual disobedience. The South Dakota Legislature has decreed that juveniles may not smoke cigarettes or possess and consume alcoholic beverages. It is also said that no person may possess illegal drugs, and it is the responsibility of the school officials to observe and enforce this legislation. Students have the right to inspect any school records that pertain to themselves and school officials may not reveal the contents of these records to anyone "not in interest."

The preceding are some of the more interesting rights of students, and students should feel free to exercise these rights as long as they also honor the responsibilities that go along with freedom. Redfield High School has made copies available to all students wishing to pick them up. It seems that not too many students have been interested enough to acquire a booklet; hopefully this apathetic attitude will not continue.

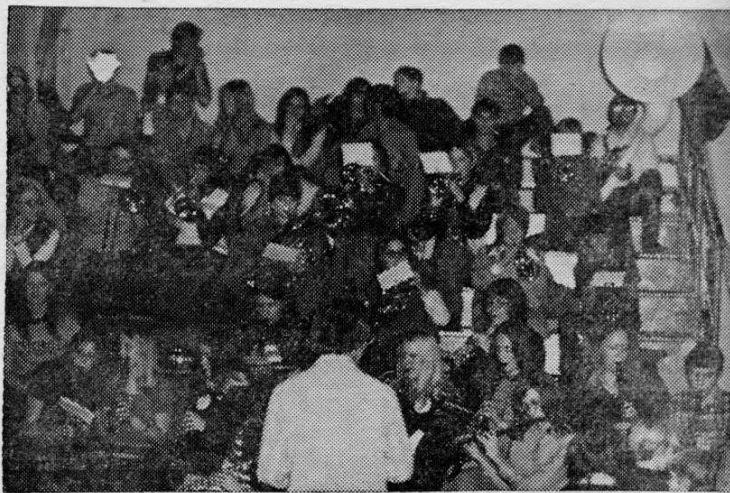

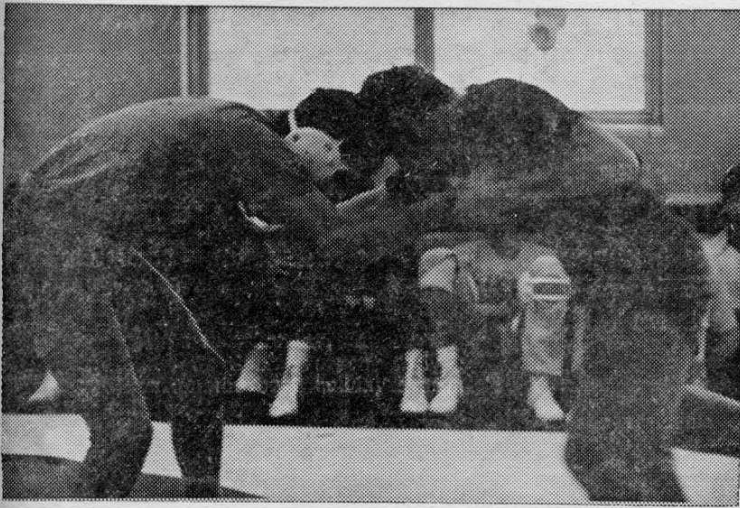

in 13, and Dave Wilson popped in 10 counters.

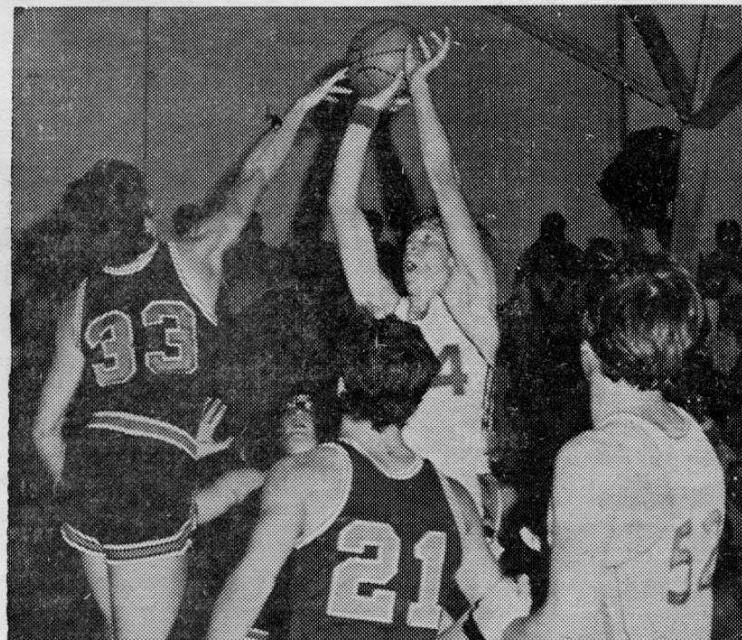
Britton

Daryl Jungwirth and Reed Siegling each canned 16 points to lead the Pheasants. Rich Jankord also scored in double figures with 13 counters.

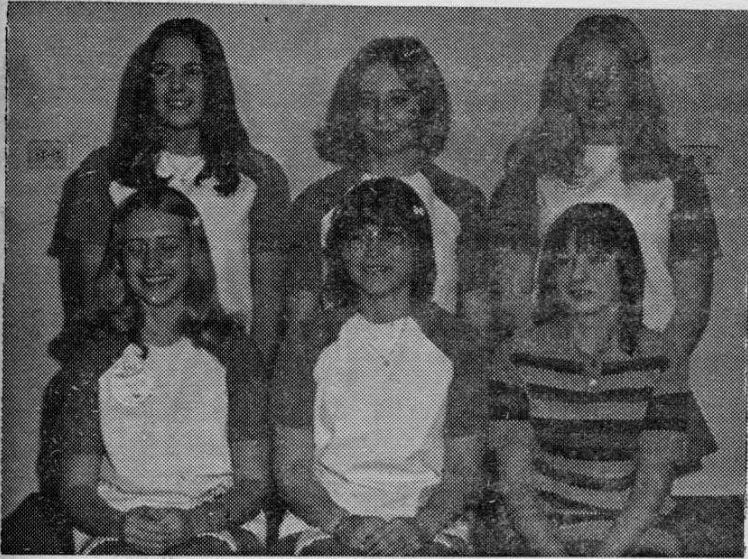
Miller

Historical Account Of AFS Reveals Former Exchange Students' Activities

In 1964 Redfield High School began the AFS program. Since then Redfield has had ten students from many different parts of the world.

Sirji Kagi, Goteborg, Sweden, was the first student to come to Redfield in the program. She lived with the Kenneth Siegling family. After graduation she enrolled in college and completed a psychology major. On February 1, 1969, she married. Her daughter was born on April 4, 1971. She and her family reside in Goteborg, where her husband is a psychology teacher.

Kenneth Goodwin was the host for Birgir Hardarson (Biggi). Biggi first graduated from business college; then he graduated from the University of Iceland in the Spring of 1971 with a major in economics.

Maria Bouwmeester Van Brink was RHS's third exchange student. She made her home with the L. J. Lambert family. When Maria returned to Apeldoorn, Holland, she entered a college at Nijmegen and studied to be an X-ray technician. She married Hink Van Brink in May, 1969.

Addis Ababa, Ethiopia is the home of Berhe Tesfamariam. While Berhe went to school in Redfield, he stayed at the Dr. Wm. Sessions' home. Berhe is a law student at Haile Selassie University, Addis Ababa. His education has been delayed several times in the past two or three years by student unrest. Whenever there is trouble, the authorities close the University and students lose time, a source of great frustration to Berhe. Ulrich Rodrian returned to Ger-

many and completed his senior year of high school. After graduation he enrolled in the University of Stuttgart in the field of physics. During his second year he was granted a World Student Fund Scholarship to study one year in the U.S.A., and also a Gulbright Travel Grant. At the present time he is attending the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Georgia.

Walter Williams was the host family for Minoo Akbariah, RHS's foreign exchange student from Tehran, Iran. Mimi entered the University in the fall with an English literature major. Presently she has two sisters and one brother attending school in the U.S.A. She was married May 29,

1971 to a civil engineer.

Studying engineering at the University of Belo Horizontes, Brazil is Edwin Villalaz, Los Santos, Panama. Edwin stayed with the Ernest Siebrecht family.

Mauricette DeVarry, Meylan, France, spent her stay at Redfield with the LeRoy Stapp family. After leaving Redfield, Moey toured the eastern part of the United States. She has been attending the University at Grenoble since the first of October and is enrolled in medicine.

Mike Pearce, England, stayed with the Joe Dvorak family during his 1971-72 school year. Mike is presently going to school in England.
