## Juniors Show Interest Through Aptitude Test

On November 20, the junior English classes were administered the Ohio Vocational Interest Survey. In summarization the greatest percentage of juniors indicated an interest in the teaching, counseling, and social work job scales. This job scale includes providing instruction or other services in a school, college, church, clinic or welfare agency. Instruction in art, music, ballet, or athletics is also included.

In addition to the above scale the second most popular job scale was caring for people and animals. This scale includes routine work, related to the day to day needs of people or animals. It includes working in a nursing home, nursery, hospital, pet store, zoo or animal laboratory.

The greatest percentage of juniors are planning to attend a four-year college or university. The Junior Class indicated that among possible vocational courses their preferences would be data processing, practical nursing, auto body repair, and basic cosmology.

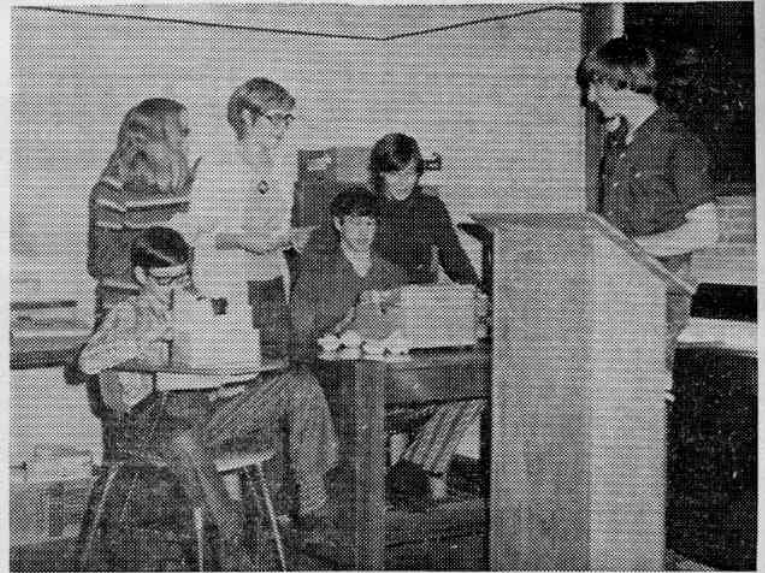
The greatest percentage of the junior class is currently enrolled

# Grapplers Garner Tourney Title; Ready For Finale With Miller

Pheasant grapplers have one remaining dual match on their 1972-1973 season schedule. They will face the Miller Rustlers on February 9 at Miller. Last year they lost to the Rustlers 22-21.

### Northern Plains

The Redfield Pheasant wrestlers took the Northern Plains Wrestling Tournament as they outlasted the Faulkton Trojans. The four team meet took place in Redfield on February 3. Redfield scored 213 points to take the meet. They were followed closely by Faulkton with 205½ points. Northwestern captured third by scoring 150½ points while Willow Lake scored 62 points.

Redfield had four individual champions. They were George Hirsch, Rick Welke, Mike Noyes, and Dan Appel. Receiving second place honors for Redfield were Jeff Gaulrapp, Andy Dickhaut, Bill Marlette, and Jerry Levtzow.

Third place winners were as follows: Ed Galvin, Bob Nuhsbaumer, Scott Hicks, Steve Betten, and Robert Jungwirth. Dave Swanson took a fourth place for Redfield while Rocky Eaton, Randy Bentz, Terry Anderson, and Dennis Becker took fifth place honors.

### Clark

Redfield wrestlers remained in second place in the Northeast Conference by defeating the Clark Comets 36-15 in Northeast Conference wrestling action. The dual match took place in Redfield on January 26.

Coach Rich Strande's mat squad started the match with two pins and two decisions in the first four matches. Mark Muellenberg at 98

pounds picked up a pin for the Pheasants over Duane Bauman of Clark in the first match. Ed Galvin followed with another pin for Redfield in the 105-pound weight class as he pinned Kevin Wookey of Clark in the first period.

Rick Welke, decisioned Clark's David Warkenthien 5-2 in the 112-pound weight class, and Jeff Gaulrapp also decisioned his opponent, Tim Wolf. Gaulrapp decisioned his foe 9-2. Andy Dickhaut drew with his opponent 3-3 in the 126-pound weight class.

Dan Appel picked up the third pin of the match for Redfield as he pinned Craig Wolf in the 138-pound weight class. In the 167-pound weight class Steve Betten walloped Marlin Ness 19-3 to pick up a decision for the Pheasants. In the heavyweight clash, Robert Jungwirth pinned Clark's Dean Alexander.

In the preliminary match the Redfield reserves continued their winning ways by downing the Clark reserves 40-12.

### Faulkton

Redfield Pheasant wrestlers turned in a fine performance as they defeated the defending State "B" champion Faulkton Trojans 35-19. The non-conference wrestling action took place in Redfield on January 24.

Redfield took the first two matches and Faulkton never made up the deficit as they trailed the whole match. Freshman Mark Muellenberg nipped Faulkton's Wade Schwartz 7-6 to start the match in the 98-pound weight class. Pheasant grappler Ed Galvin pinned his Faulkton opponent, Sid Tomeck, in the 105-pound weight class.

# Cagers Top Comets, Prepare For Braves

Redfield will journey to Britton on February 16 for a NEC basketball game. The Braves are currently ranked third in the state class "B" poll.

Miller's Rustlers will invade Redfield on February 17 for a non-conference basketball game. The Pheasants will be out to avenge a loss earlier this season to Miller. The Rustlers topped the Pheasants 70-46 in the Big 4 Tournament.

### Roncalli

Redfield cagers dropped a 109-73 decision to the Roncalli Cavaliers on February 2. The conference tilt was played in Aberdeen.

Roncalli shot a torrid 78 per cent for the first quarter, and raced to a 29-19 lead. The early

lead was too much for the Pheasants to overcome, and Roncalli slowly pulled away throughout the remainder of the game.

Daryl Jungwirth led the Pheasants in scoring with 22 points. Kevin Gaulrapp came off the bench to add 14 counters. Steve Jones and Reed Siegling each dropped in 11 for Redfield.

Roncalli held an edge in the statistics. The Pheasants grabbed 37 rebounds to Roncalli's 43. Redfield shot 40 per cent from the floor; the Cavaliers shot 59 per cent for the game.

Coach Sam Willit's "B" squad were edged by the Roncalli junior varsity, 45-42. Gerald Nuhsbaumer and Dave Wilson each threw in 10 points to lead the Chicks.

### Faulkton

Coach Lonnie Scriver's cagers dropped a nonconference tilt at Faulkton on January 25. The Pheasants came out on the short end of a 65-51 score.

Redfield stayed close to the Trojans in the first period, trailing only 15-13. Although the Pheasants regained the lead 29-27 at the half, Faulkton pulled away in the second half.

Daryl Jungwirth and Rich Jan-kord potted 12 points apiece to lead the Pheasants. Steve Jones knocked in 11 counters.

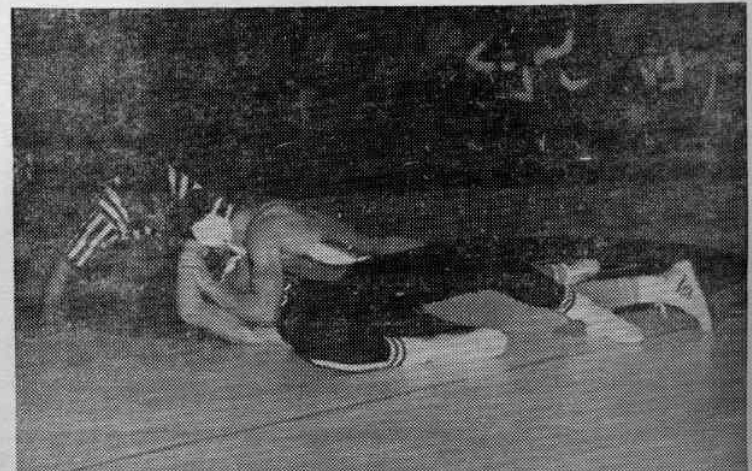
Redfield's "B" squad won its second game in two nights by edging Faulkton 33-30. Freshman John Long threw in 12 points to pace the Chicks.

RHS cagers returned from Clark January 24 with a 54-50 decision over the Comets. The contest upped the Pheasants' NEC record

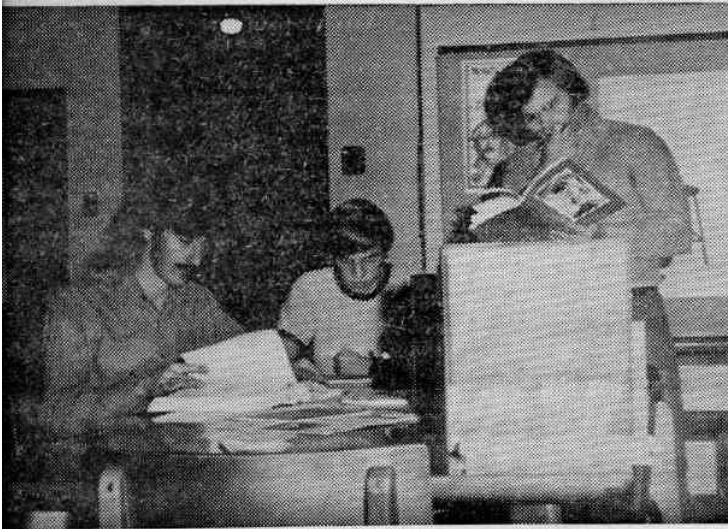

# Counselor Discusses Financing Education

Recently Mrs. Madlynn Forsyth, guidance counselor, sent letters to the parents of each Senior and Junior Class member. These letters discussed the financing of higher educational programs.

With the cost of education soaring, many students are faced with the problem of financing their way through a higher educational program. Various financial assistance programs help make up the difference between college costs and the student's financial resources.

Scholarships are one of the financial aids. They are offered by a particular college, organizations, corporations, national competition and many other ways. Students

with an exceptional financial need may receive an educational opportunity grant. These grants are allocated annually to the schools.

Federally insured student loans may be borrowed from banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions, pension funds, and insurance companies. Students may also apply for short-term loans from funds available through a particular school's endowment association.

Medical students, while not eligible for National Defense Student Loans, are eligible for the health professions student loan program. Part-time employment through the school student Personnel Office for on and off campus jobs may be obtained while a student is attending the college of his choice.
