Jim's responsibility will be to put out the district paper called the MINN-DAKOTA KEY. The paper comes out once a month.

Tim will be responsible for taking the minutes at the Board of Trustees meetings. The job also includes keeping complete file records of the district and acquiring information for a district directory.

Johnson was one of the three chosen by Governor Randy Bush. In all, thirteen girls had entered the competition.

Mr. Joseph Rice, International Trustee, and Mr. Carl Adams, District Kiwanis Governor, gave speeches at the convention. Mr. Herbert Brokering and Mr. Gary McCord also addressed the Conventioners.

Senior competition was further divided into two parts, open and scholarship competition. Seniors planning to attend Northern next year participated for scholarships, and the other seniors were placed in the open competition.

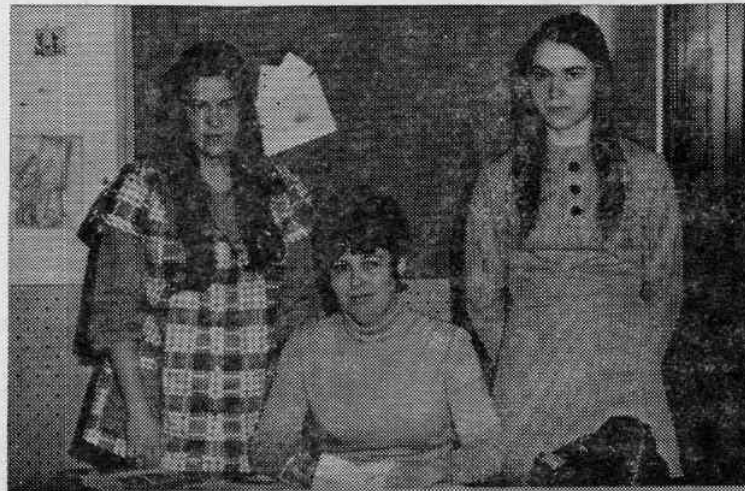
Bill Betten captured second place in the open section, and received a transistor radio as his prize. Larry Crook won a \$200 scholarship for grabbing first place in that section.

From The Editor...

Are You Immune To 'Decidophobia?'

Do you crave a life without choice? That is the problem with which PSYCHOLOGY TODAY challenges us. Will decidophobia lock us up in an existence without autonomy?

Decisions are one thing from which we can never escape and as we grow older and advance to more complicated and responsible positions the decisions we will face will become tougher and tougher. Decisions are the cause of much apprehension to all of us at one time or another. But what we must learn to do is face decisions head on. Trying to avoid decisions or refusing to make decisions results in the things we call decidophobia.

According to authorities decidophobes have three basic options. They can avoid fateful decisions, they can stack the cards so that one alternative is clearly right, or they can decline responsibilities. The decidophobe fools himself by using these methods and the result is an unhealthy mental attitude.

There are many strategies that one can employ to avoid decision-making. Some of the major ones are to let religion, status quo, or tradition make decisions for you. By letting these factors influence one's thinking one becomes limited and eliminates choice. Allying yourself to a movement or school of thought also props up the decidophobe. These strategies aim at making no fateful decisions at all, or at the most one decision, to make no more fateful decisions.

Manichaeism is the name given to the method where the individual insists on making a decision but loads it so all good is on one side and all evil is on the other side, thus allowing the decision to make itself. Other strategies are moral rationalism, withdrawing from involvement so important decisions are never met, faith that one is riding the wave to the future, and the last strategy is marriage. This group does not avoid decision making but develops a situation in which it is not needed.

We must realize these ten strategies and resist temptation of using them. We should not try to compare ourselves to others or become side tracked or bogged down. Autonomy consists of making with open eyes the decisions that give shape to our lives. Only by deciding can we liberate our minds for a truly free existence.

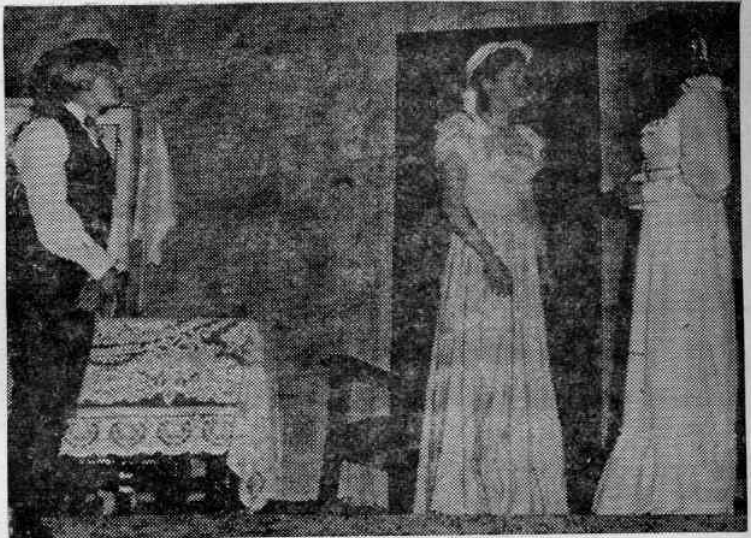
Peggy Solheim was chosen as Frankfort's Girl State representative. She will attend the annual event on June 3-9 at Mitchell.

RHS Female Thinclads Show Power In Early Season Duals, Invitationals

RHS girls' track team won their two opening meets. They competed in a sextangular meet in Aberdeen on April 14, and in a dual with Pierre on April 5.

In the Aberdeen meet the 440 yard relay team including Cindy Hansen, Darlys Olsen, Sheila Stapp and Lavone Opitz, placed second. The mile relay team captured third place. Darlys, Patty Miesen, Kathy Jungwirth and Kelly Miller are the four on the mile relay team. The medley relay team, Cindy, Lana Moeller, Merilee Engelbrecht and Julie Christman, took fourth place.

Lavone captured first; Lana, second; and Dana, fourth in the 100 meter hurdles. Lavone's time was :16.7. In the 80 yard hurdles Lana placed second and Dana captured fifth.

In the sprints, Kelly placed second in the 440 and Cindy captured second in the 100 yard dash. In the 880 yard run, Patty captured first place with a time of 2:39.2 and Linda Meisel placed fourth.

A new school record was set in discus when Leah Muellenberg placed fourth, with a throw of 84 feet, 10½ inches. Sharon Jungwirth placed third in shot and Julie Christman captured fourth in high jump. In long jump Lavone placed first with a jump of 16 feet, 4 inches. Cindy also placed third in long jump.

In a dual girls' track meet with Pierre here on April 5, Redfield won 95-40. Lavone Opitz was a quadruple winner for Redfield.

She won 80 yard hurdles and long jump. She also took first in two relays. In the medley relay, she was helped by Cindy Hansen. Gwen Zens and Darlys Olsen. The 440 yard relay included Lavone,

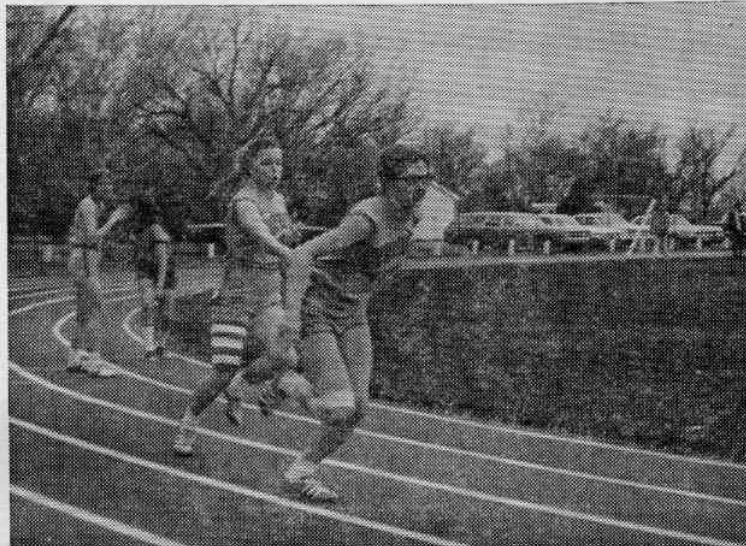
Sheila Stapp, Lana Moeller and Cindy. They ran the medley in 2 minutes flat; the time of the 440 was 54.3.

The mile relay, including Darlys, Patty Miesen, Kathy Jungwirth, and Kelly Miller, had a time of 4:31 and placed second. Patty also placed first in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:42.

Merilee Engelbrecht, Kelly, Kathy, and Gwen ran the 880 yard relay in 1:58.5 and captured first. In 80 yard hurdles Redfield pulled in the first four places. Lavone

took first; Dana Sporer, second; Lana Moeller, third; and Julie Christman, fourth. Cindy captured second, and Dana took fourth place in the 100 yard dash.

A new school record was made when Denise Becker threw the shot 31 feet 5 inches. In shot, Connie Robinson took second; Kathy, third; and Leah Muellenberg captured fourth place. Cheryl Meisel took first in discus with a throw of 77 feet 11 inches. Marlene Stempner captured second, and Connie took fourth place.

Runners Take Dual; Conquer Sioux Meet

Track season bursts into full bloom in the next few weeks and Redfield tracksters are accordingly busy. The Redfield Relays are April 19, and the Watoma Relays at Watertown are scheduled for April 21. The Big Four Track Meet will be run at Redfield April 25, and the thinclads will journey to the Sisseton Relays April 27.

Lacking a single first place finish, the Redfield track team captured the team title at the Sioux Relays April 13 at Eagle Butte. The Pheasants nipped Rapid City Douglas to win the meet for the first time in RHS history.

Kevin Boschee and Scott Hicks were easily the standouts for the Redfield team. Boschee flashed to third place finishes in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes. The senior sprinter also ran on the third

place 880 yard relay team of Eric Flint, Don Bruce, Boschee and Hicks. Along with the 880 relay Hicks also copped second in the 180 yard low hurdles, third in the 120 yard high hurdles, and second in the long jump, losing to the winner by only one-half inch.

Both the mile and two-mile relay teams dashed to fourth-place finishes. The mile team consisted of Don Bruce, Don Muellenberg, Bill Marlette, Bob Severance. Rick Marlette, Bill Betten, Denis Guentner and Severance made up the two-mile team.

Sophomore John Lindberg nabbed fourth in the mile run. Bruce followed Hicks in the high hurdles as he procured fourth place, and Lonnie Robertson jumped to a fifth place finish in the pole vault.

Coach Ken Greeno's RHS thinclads scored their third win in as many meets over the Pierre Governors April 5. Redfield won the dual meet at the Redfield athletic field by a 71-60 tally.

Sophomore John Lindberg provided the highlight of the day when he shattered the school two-mile run record, which was previously held by Bob Zundel. Lindberg's time of 10:30.9 eclipsed the old record by eight seconds. Lindberg also picked up a second place in the mile run.

Steve Betten and Scott Hicks were double winners for the Pheasants. Betten swept the shotput and the discus, while Hicks garnered two firsts in the high and low hurdles. Hicks was also a close second in the long jump. Bob Miller picked up another first for the Pheasants with a good pole vault of 11', and Bob Severance ran a very respectable :54.6 quarter mile to capture that event.

Pierre won all of the relays and most of the individual events, but the deciding factor was the depth of the Redfield squad. Lonnie Robertson and Don Muellenberg grabbed runner-up finishes in the pole vault and quarter mile, respectively. Kevin Boschee clinched seconds in his specialties, the 100 and 220 yard dashes. Denis Guentner claimed a second in the 880 yard run, and Rich Jankord was second in the 180 yard low hurdles. In the weights department, Butch Jungwirth procured a second place finish in the shotput; and Terry Anderson nabbed a second in the discus.

Redfield's novice division tracksters were downed 86-28 by a crack Pierre squad. The Chicks' lone winners were Bill Marlette in the high hurdles and Mike Noyes in the mile run.

Clyde Harr received his State Farmer degree at the State FFA convention held in Brookings. Other Redfield chapter members also earned recognition at the April 9-10 event.

The State Farmer degree is awarded to only 2 per cent of the State FFA membership. It is based on the student supervised farming program.

Judging contests were held in eight areas: livestock, quarterhorse, dairy and dairy products, crops, farm mechanics, poultry, meats, and speech. Approximately 65 3-member teams participated in all the contests except speech. Five RHS members entered this event.

Redfield teams placed in five of the events. Crops ranked 17th honorable mention; livestock ranked 16th excellent; poultry ranked 13th excellent. Dairy cattle ranked 19th honorable mention, and quarterhorse ranked 2nd excellent.

Individual awards went to Dave Jessen with honorable mention in livestock judging and excellent in quarterhorse. Doug Fink received excellent in both livestock and

quarterhorse. Paul Lemmer and Larry Jessen earned honorable mention in farm mechanics and poultry, respectively. George Schade received an excellent in meats while Mark Muellenberg and Bob Hardie both received excellent in crops.

Two individuals received superior ratings. They were Dale Crump, 13th in poultry; and Dennis Sanger, 13th in dairy cattle.

Mr. Rich Larson stated that he is pleased with the results of the boys this year. They finished the season with a 12th out of 21 placings.
